THE BAPTISM THAT BONDS

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. – Ephesians 4:4-6

This week I packed up my photo of the time we stood in the Jordan River and remembered our Baptism. "Remember your Baptism and be thankful." We spoke those words years ago, and they are fresh in my ears still today. We say the same words each time Baptismal Remembrance waters anoint foreheads here at Canterbury. I've found that Baptismal Remembrance helps me to cherish God's gift of love shown to us in Jesus. But it's also a reminder to see Baptism everywhere. It's an invitation to savor the sacred moments when friends and family demonstrate God's presence and power. The longer we follow the God of Jesus Christ, the more we experience those unexpected Baptismal Remembrance moments. They've shown up quite a lot for me during the seven years I've worked here at Canterbury.

- Through the sweaty July work of repairing roofs, I've watched God remind a single-parent family that they are loved. And the 7th graders I worked with showed me what servant leadership looks like.
- I've opened scriptures together with you in small groups. Routine stuff, really. And then, out of the blue, God offers a tailor-made message for that seemingly insurmountable moment I was going through.
- In hospitals, I've held wrinkled, sun-stained hands and prayed for healing. I've been reminded that God is present in all times and places even as we walk through the valley of the shadow of death.
- In worship, our music, creeds, and prayers get topped off with sacred bread and wine. Ancient elements spark the imagination, and I'm taken deeper and wider than the present moment to connect with centuries of Jesus followers.

On most days, it's easy to look past things like roofing nails, hospital gowns, and steeples. But every now and then, the Holy Spirit rips open the windows of normal life. The church acts as a megaphone calling to the world, "Remember your baptism, folks!" For those who hear and respond, we discover there's a Love more powerful than death. Through the sacred ordinariness of life together, the risen Jesus reminds us that we belong to God and we're empowered to love one another. Thanks be to God for the Baptism that bonds us!
